## **President's Message**

## Courtney Myers, MPH, REHS Stark County Health Department

Dear OEHA Members,

I hope this message finds you well and enjoying the early signs of spring. This is a particularly busy time for the Ohio Environmental Health Association (OEHA), as we have begun the 136th



General Assembly and Ohio's biennial budget process. I want to provide you with an important update on key legislative developments and initiatives that may impact environmental health in Ohio. The OEHA Board, in collaboration with Hicks Partners, is actively navigating this shifting landscape as new developments occur.

## Solid Waste Proponent Testimony: House Bill 96

Earlier this month, I had the privilege of providing proponent testimony on behalf of OEHA regarding HB 96 Ohio's Biennial Operating Budget. Within the proposed budget OEPA included changes to solid waste funding. In Ohio, 65 local health departments partner with Ohio EPA by playing a vital role in the regulation of solid and infectious waste, and construction and demolition debris (C&DD) programs.

Currently, the funding for Solid Waste Programs is limited, with local health departments relying on a small percentage of facility license fees and unreliable grant funding from their respective solid waste management districts. HB 96 proposes to address this issue by reallocating fees to local health departments. Specifically, OPEA's proposed language would do away with the \$1.60 per ton C&DD fee at Municipal Solid Waste Landfills, although this rate would still apply at C&DD landfills. Of the tipping fees paid at Municipal Solid Waste Landfills \$0.45 per ton would be allocated to local health departments. If passed this would create a sustainable funding model for Solid Waste Programs. OEHA is strongly in favor of the "As Introduced" version of this legislation, as it establishes a reliable funding stream for maintaining this crucial program.

## Microenterprise Home Kitchen Operations: House Bill 134

House Bill 134, introduced by Representatives Gross and Humphrey, seeks to establish a new pathway for individuals to prepare and sell food from their homes, known as Microenterprise Home Kitchen Operations. OEHA's Food Committee, led by Chair Scott Whittaker, is currently reviewing the proposed Bill and will make recommendations to the Board. We will continue to monitor this Bill closely.

## **REHS Occupational Credential:** House Bill 59

As mentioned in the previous Journal, the Registered Environmental Health Specialist (REHS) credential is undergoing a review as part of the General Assembly's Occupational License Review. Last fall, OEHA established an Ad-Hoc Committee on Occupational Credential Review, supported by Tony Brigano and Lauren Strope at Hicks Partners, to prepare for potential legislative changes.

As expected, Representatives Fowler Arthur and Hiner have introduced a placeholder House Bill 59. This bill aims to revise and streamline occupational regulations to better accommodate Ohio's workforce. OEHA's workgroup, having spent the past several months preparing, has developed proposed language to ensure the integrity of the REHS credential, while also strengthening the environmental health workforce across the state. We will continue to work with our legislative partners throughout the legislative process and will provide you updates along the way.

### **Annual Education Conference (AEC)**

The OEHA Annual Education Conference (AEC) is fast approaching! Mark your calendars for April 10 & 11, 2025, at the Columbus Marriott Northwest. OEHA Vice President Emily Tyler, Vice President-Elect Alyssa Suto and their team have been working tirelessly to craft an exceptional conference. This event is a fantastic opportunity to earn CEUs, network with colleagues, and deepen your engagement with the organization.

In addition to the main conference sessions, we are offering pre-conference events, including a fun outing at Combat Ops and an
